

South Africa's energy sector is facing numerous challenges, all contributing to our current energy crisis and with a direct bearing on our country's future. We must decisively deal with energy security and load shedding, whilst urgently securing broad sector reforms and accelerating largescale investment. The Energy Council aims to enable a unified strategy and vision for a South African energy transition pathway that will support clean industrialisation and global competitiveness, address our economic and social deficits and importantly contribute to a sustainable environment.



MESSAGE FROM THE CEO

There is a saying which goes as follows, "In God we trust; for everything else bring Data." Predicting an end to load shedding is an impossible task, especially while we continue to have an unreliable Eskom coal fleet, and hence an unpredictable Energy Availability Factor (EAF). The data on load shedding however, indicates that we have hit an inflection point in 2024 and are tracking on a very different trajectory compared to

2023.



Over the past 12 weeks, cumulative load shedding measured in TWhrs was 66% lower year on year (5.8 TWhrs to 1.97 TWhrs). This was due to 24% fewer load shedding days over the period. Of the load shedding days experienced, 85% of 2023's load shedding days were between stage 4 to stage 6, yet 91% of 2024's load shedding days were between stage 2 to stage 4.

Although the Eskom EAF remains low, the data also shows that it has stabilised from the historic 3% average year-on-year decline from nearly 78% in 2018 to 54.7% in 2023. Modelling the data, a stable EAF at 55%, combined with the forecasted rapid growth of wind and solar generation in 2024 and 2025, reduces load-shedding from 2023 levels by 97%. This leaves us with an average of intermittent stage 1 in 2025.

This is interesting data, but data doesn't make decisions and there is a lot of hard work and decisive action required to make sure we realise these positive opportunities. With an end in sight to load shedding, and progress on key reforms such as the Electricity Regulation Amendment (ERA) Bill, the formation of the National Transmission Company and the introduction of a wholesale market, we are starting to rebuild trust in our energy system and the ability to say we have turned the corner on our energy crisis.




